Fortunately for Conrad, he does have sufficient batting options with players that do have Test experience. Besides De Zorzi and Elgar, there is also Keegan Petersen, Zubayr Hamza and Khaya Zondo.

Promising batters such as Raynard van Tonder, Josh Richards, Janneman Malan and the returning David Beddingham are also available. Conrad's greater headache is the lack

of options among the bowlers - both seam and spin. He may be forced to send a Ben Stokes-like SMS to Western Province veteran Dane Paterson after the swing bowler enjoyed another successful season with Nottinghamshire in the English County Championship.

Paterson has previously played two Tests, four ODI's and eight T20I's for the Proteas.

Fellow Proteas-capped Test seamers Duanne Olivier, Lutho Sipamla and Glenton Stuurman also went unsold at the auction and are available for selection. Sipamla and Stuurman both played against the Black Caps in Christchurch on the last tour to New Zealand.

Unfortunately, both Olivier and Sipamla are currently not playing for the Lions in the CSA One-Day Cup, while Stuurman is heavily out of form after conceding over a 100 runs on debut for his new provincial team, the Rocks, last weekend.

There are even fewer spin options with Titans all-rounder Neil Brand's left-arm spin possibly set to be called upon, while veteran leg-spinner Shaun von Berg could be handed a Test debut.

CSA ONE-DAY CUP Smith continues to shine for the Dolphins

THE Dolphins have had an excellent start to the season despite having to share points on two occasions due to rain affected matches – first at home against the Rocks, then away to the Lions on Wednesday.

The only fixture so far in their One-Day Cup campaign that had a result was the three-wicket victory over the Dragons at Kingsmead, a victory that was spearheaded by Jason Smith's unbeaten 116.

Smith has been the backbone of the Dolphins top-order as the Cape Town-born cricketer followed up his century with a run-a-ball 65 earlier this week at the Wan-

In only his second season since completing a move to Durban, Smith has made a name for himself, so much that the SA20 franchises showed interest in his services

with Durban's Super Giants paying R175

"When I was home, everything was too easy for me. Obviously, because I was sponging off the parents and doing as I pleased," Smith told Independent Media

about his decision to switch coasts.

"I've never stayed on my own before coming to Durban so this was basically about taking myself outside of my comfort zone. It's allowed me to be myself on and off the field, also the Dolphins management has allowed that.

"Immy (head coach Imraan Khan) is the main cause for that because he's quite similar to me in the sense that we're both very chilled, relaxed people so that allows people to be themselves.

The Dolphins will travel to Gqeberha to take on the Warriors tomorrow and they will be met with a stinging reminder of their 31-run loss to the Robin Peterson's men last season.

On Sunday, the North West Dragons will welcome the Rocks to Potchefstroom, with both teams looking to open their account in the competition. Having lost to Western Province and the Dolphins, the Dragons are in desperate need of a victory to get their campaign going.

However, the Rocks suffered a heavy defeat at Centurion last week, losing by a whooping 237 runs, meaning Sunday's clash is just as important to the Boland team as it is to the Dragons.

Warner is still the key for the Aussies

LOVE him or hate him, David Warner's self-belief and single-mindedness has seen him withstand scandals and slumps to remain Australia's key batsman at the World Cup.

One of the most polarising players in cricket since his international debut in 2009, left-handed opener Warner is the centrepiece of Australia's batting order in the twilight of his legendary career.

He will turn 37 during the World Cup in India.

While unconvincing in Test cricket in recent years, where his position in the team has been the subject of immense scrutiny, Warner has maintained strong form in the 50-over format. He's hit the second most ODI centuries by an Australian batsman and scored over 6 300 runs overall at a healthy average of around 45.

With long-time opening partner Aaron Finch retired and successor Travis Head under an injury cloud, Warner will be relied upon at the top of the order in his swansong from ODI cricket.

Despite his critics lining up, a typically bullish Warner is determined to leave on his own terms having publicly laid out his retirement plans, where he also wants to exit Test cricket with a farewell match on his Sydney home ground in January.

"I probably owe it to myself and my family," Warner said in June when announcing his future intentions. "I've played every game like it's my

last. I enjoy being around the guys. "I love being part of the team and

being that ball of energy in the group. I'll keep working as hard as I can to get there." If all goes to plan, it will be some-

thing of an unlikely fairytale ending

for Warner, whose career looked over

in 2018 after he was named as the chief

protagonist of Australia's humiliating ball-tampering scandal at Newlands in South Africa. Warner received a 12-month suspension for instructing teammate Cameron Bancroft to use sandpaper

on the ball and was also banned from leadership positions for life. Much like his attacking batting,

Warner hit back against the odds, returning with aplomb across three formats to maintain a formidable presence at the crease. Short but nuggety, Warner's strong forearms generate immense power, resulting in one of the most aggressive batsmen in cricket history. "The courage to play his own way

... the guts to take on the pace bowlers with the new ball, that is no mean feat," former Australia captain Ian Chappell wrote in *cricinfo* recently.

"It's something that he should be remembered for - not many have the courage to not only do it but to maintain that approach throughout a lengthy career."

Ahead of the World Cup, Warner turned back the clock with a belligerent century against South Africa in Bloemfontein in a statement to those who have written him off.

"I saw some really good signs with David Warner in South Africa," said former wicketkeeper Brad Haddin, who was part of Australia's 2015 World Cup

triumph alongside Warner. "He looked like he wanted to take the game on and when he does that it takes the pressure off the rest of the batting order. I think he's ready for a

big tournament and a great finale."



Conrad will have to search far and wide for players

Youngsters' involvement

PROTEAS Test coach Shukri Conrad may have to trawl deep into his phone book when he eventually sits down to pick his team for the tour to New Zealand next

Already hamstrung due to the overlapping of the SA20 back home and the New Zealand tour, which ruled out the majority of top-tier South African players, Conrad's task was made even harder after the mini-auction on Wednesday in Johannesburg.

Arguably the biggest setback on Wednesday evening was wicketkeeper Kyle Verreynne being picked up by the Pretoria Capitals for the base price of R175 000. Verreynne struck a century against the Black Caps on the Proteas' last tour to New Zealand and was a strong candidate to captain the Test side this time around.

Instead, Conrad may now turn to Western Province's Tony de Zorzi after the dreadlocked left-hander went unsold at the auction. De Zorzi recently led the South Africa 'A' side, which Conrad

coached, on a winter tour to Sri Lanka. Former Test captain Dean Elgar also went unsold at the auction and is available for selection and could be utilised
